There is a debate as to whether these inscriptions refer to Asherah the goddess or an asherah as cultic object. One reason for the debate is that in the Kuntillet Ajrud and Khirbet el-Qom inscriptions pronominal suffixes show Yahweh having possession of the noun "asherah", implying that this was an object. Ancient Hebrew did not use pronominal suffixes on proper nouns such as people or deities; however, other Semitic languages closely related to Hebrew did use such suffixes.

On the other hand, asherah is most frequently a cult object, and a special form of a fertility goddess in the shape of a tree goddess.

It is the cult of Asherah, as a Hebrew goddess, that drives her investigation. Hadley begins (Chap. 1) with an introduction to the question, "What/who is asherah?" as posed by the biblical texts, followed by a history of scholarship represented by the ten dissertations and three broader studies that preceded her own.

The suffix in the form of affiliation modifier (אשרתהּ = "his Asherah") which is found in the inscriptions from Kuntillet 'Ajrud and Khirbet el-Qom, and which, in Hebrew, is typical for nouns and not for proper names, may refer to either a still cult object (in the form of a noun), or to a title of a goddess (then "Yahweh and his Asherah" might mean "Yahweh and his queen-goddess")...

Alternative Titles: Baalat, Elat, Elath, Qudshu. Asherah, ancient West Semitic goddess, consort of the supreme god. Her principal epithet was probably "She Who Walks on the Sea.". She was occasionally called Elath (Elat), "the Goddess," and may have also been called Qudshu, "Holiness.". According to texts from Ugarit (modern Ras Shamra, Syria), Asherah's consort was El, and by him she was the mother of 70 gods.

However, as the book religion solidified, Asherah became increasingly marginalized in the scriptures to the point of being reduced to her cult object—the stylized tree or wooden pole which became known as asherah or asherim. Trees were revered as symbols of life and nourishment in arid regions and so became associated with Asherah and her cult.

The 'asherah' in question is most likely a cultic object, although the relationship of this object (a stylised tree perhaps) to Yahweh and to the goddess Asherah, consort of 'El, is unclear. It has been suggested that the Israelites may have considered Asherah as the consort of Ba'al, due to the anti-Asherah ideology which was influenced by the Deuteronomistic Historians, at the later period of the kingdom. The Hebrew bible uses the term asherah in two senses, as a cult object and as a divine name. As a cult object, the asherah can be "made", "cut down", and "burnt", and Deuteronomy 16:21 prohibits the planting of trees as asherah, implying that a stylised tree or lopped trunk is intended.

The goddess Asherah, as the mother of the gods in Canaanite mythology, could also be linked to fertility.
